When printing this pattern it is important to print it full size. When you bring up the print dialog box look in the “Page Sizing & Handling” section. Make sure the “Actual Size” is selected before you hit print.

You also only need to print the page/s you need. After the print dialog opens look for the “Pages to Print” section. You can print the current page or a range of pages. This will help save ink by not printing the title/instruction pages.

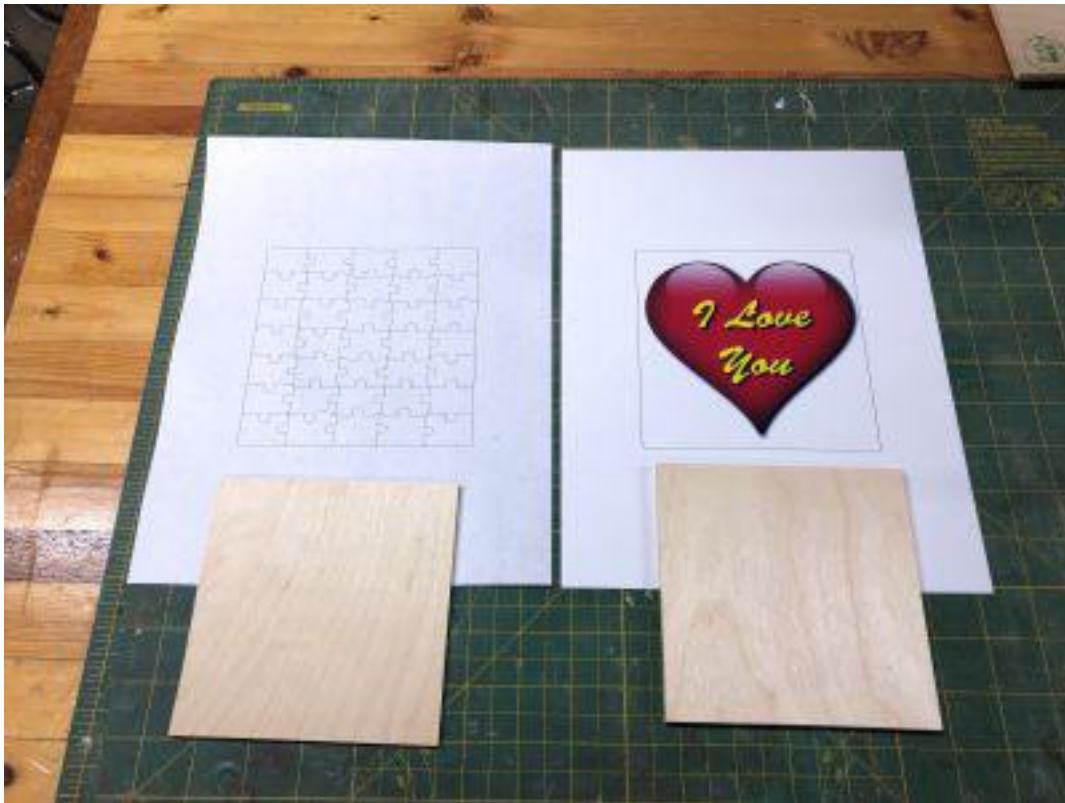
Printing Instructions



Valentines Day Heart Jigsaw Puzzle



Print the included heart picture on high quality photo paper. If you print on regular paper the puzzle will not hold up well.



You will need two 5" X 5" sheets of Baltic birch plywood. One sheet can be 1/4" thick and the second sheet can be 1/8" thick. Both can be 1/4" thick if that is all you have.

Cut both the image and the template to size.

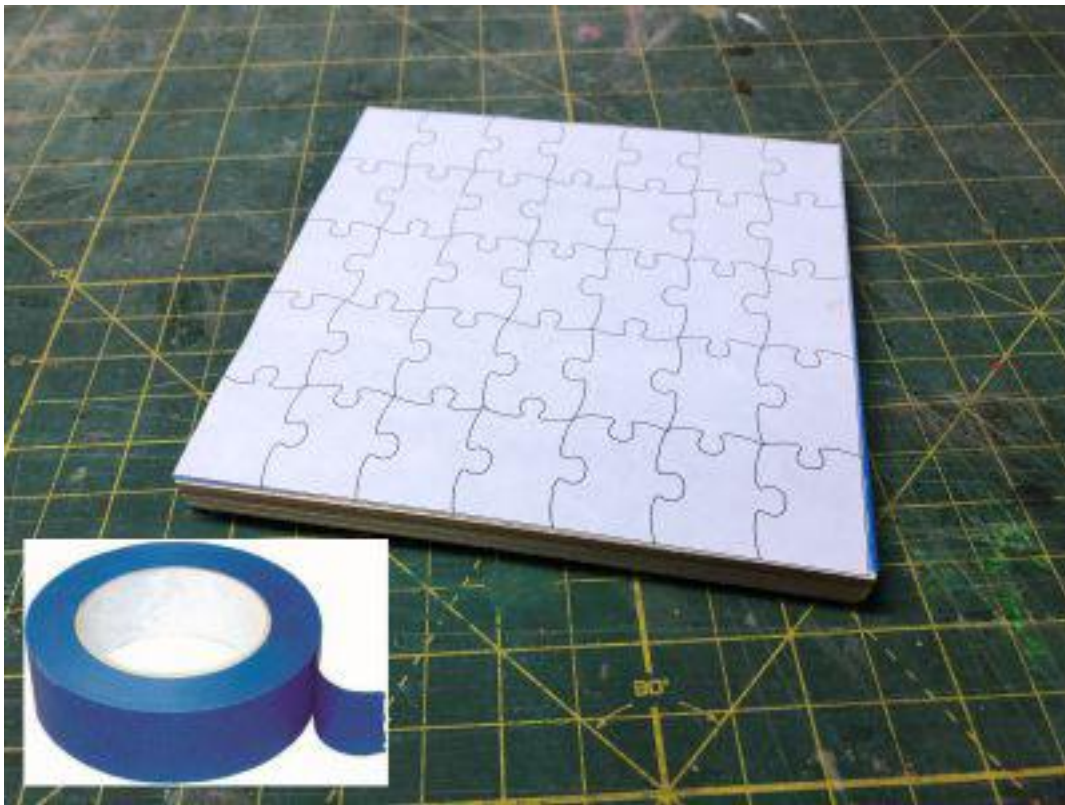




Use spray adhesive to attache the picture to the 1/4" BB ply.
For a permanent bond spray both the picture and the board.

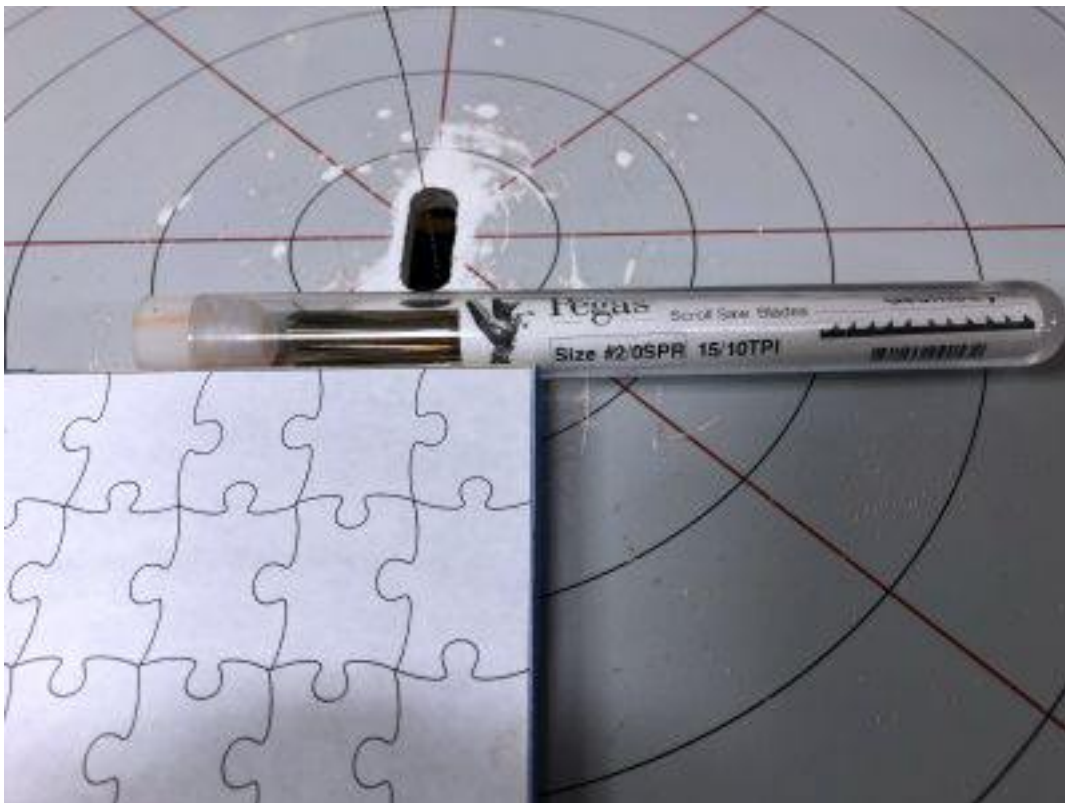
You can then place the second board on top of the picture
so you sandwich the picture between the two boards.

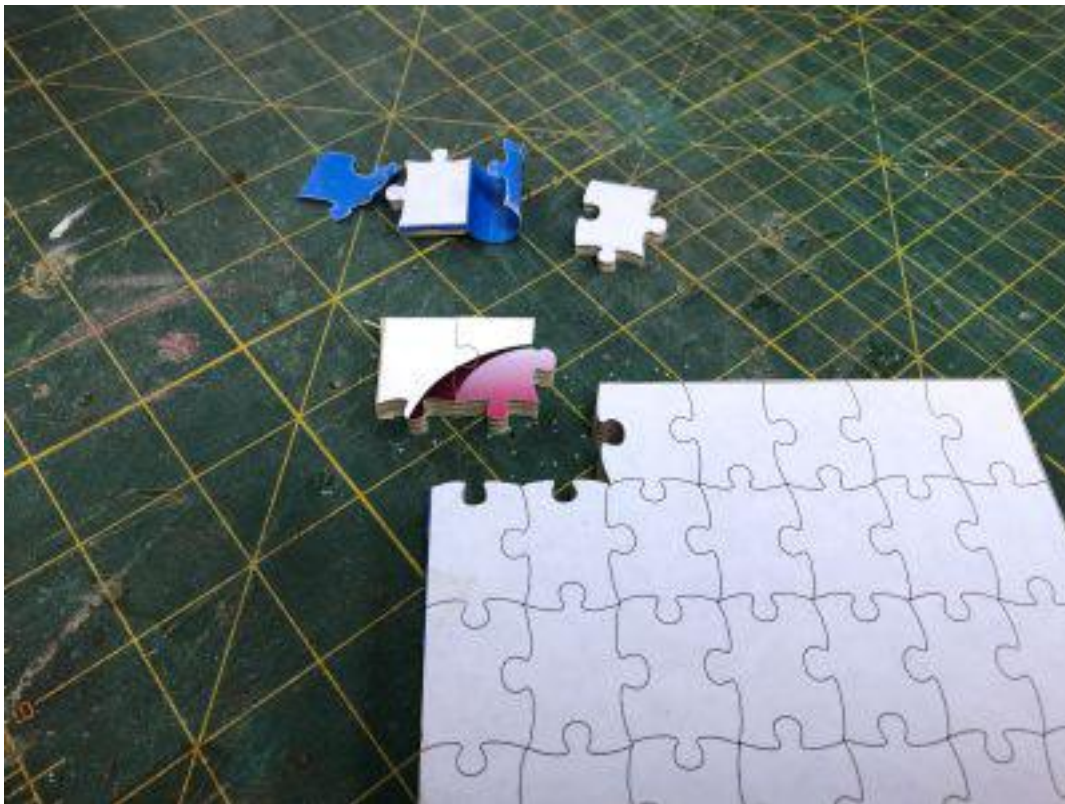




Wrap the sandwich with blue painters tape.
Use the spray adhesive to attache the puzzle template to the
top of the sandwich.

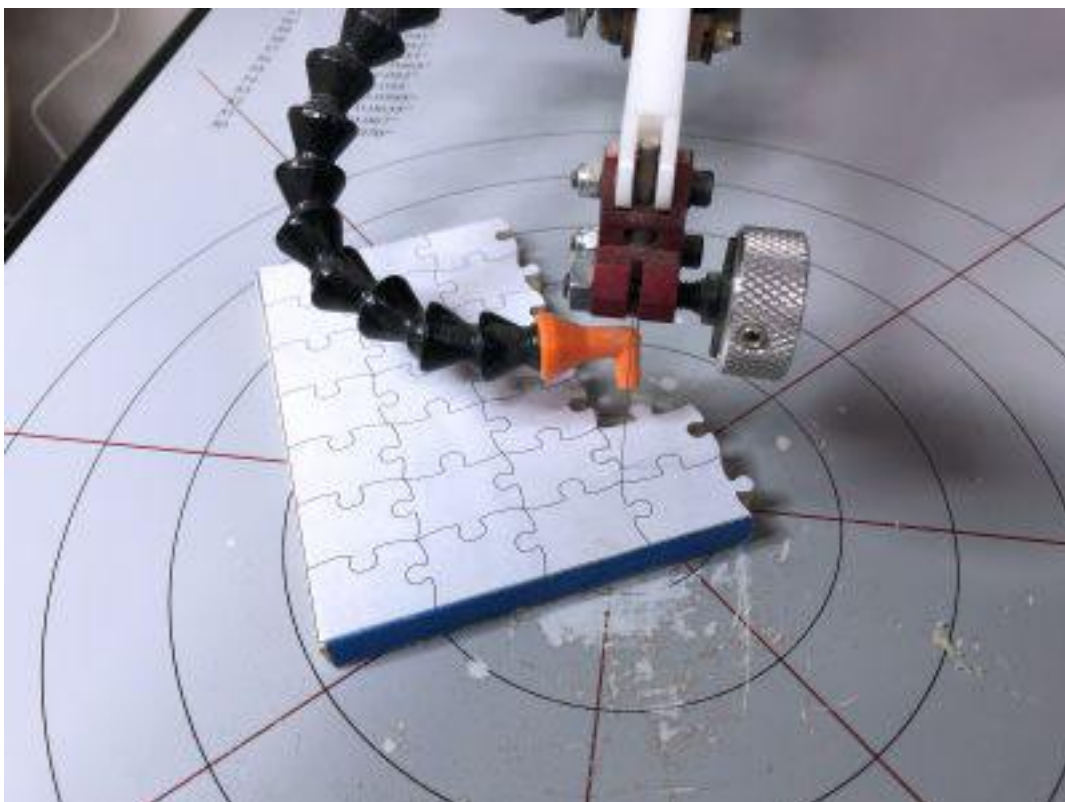
You need a very thin kerf so the pieces fit snug together after
being cut. I am using a Pegas #2/0 blade.





Begin cutting out the pieces. It makes it easier if you reassemble the puzzles as you cut the pieces.

The small #2/0 blade will dull quickly as you cut the plywood. It will become more difficult to follow the pattern line as the blade get dull. Replace it as needed.





Continue cutting until all the pieces are cut.

It may be necessary to do some light sanding on the back of each piece.

You can use a spray fixative over the picture to protect it. I have found this helpful but not critical if you use a high quality photo paper.



Print on high quality photo paper.
