



When printing this pattern it is important to print it full size. When you bring up the print dialog box look in the "Page Sizing & Handling" section. Make sure the "Actual Size" is selected before you hit print.

You also only need to print the page/s you need. After the print dialog opens look for the "Pages to Print" section. You can print the current page or a range of pages. This will help save ink by not printing the title/instruction pages.

## **Printing Instructions**





Vinyl stickers cut on a scroll saw.





For this project we will use Oracal 651 glossy vinyl. It is permanent outdoor rated vinyl.


You will need two sheets of 1/8" thick Baltic birch plywood for the carrier.. Cut as many sheets of the vinyl as you wish to cut. You can stack can several at a time. I have cut up to 10.





Use blue painters tape to make a stacked sandwhich of all the pieces.

Drill your holes for the interior cuts. I like to use a #2/0 reverse blade for a nice smooth cut.





Make your cuts then remove all the vinyl stickers.





Now we are going to apply our sticker to the vinyl transfer tape. Remove the backing paper from the transfer tape. Lay the tape down sticky side up.





Lay the vinyl sticker on the transfer tape face down. Use your finger to make sure the vinyl is stuck down well.

Gently remove the paper backing from the vinyl.





Prepare the object that will take the sticker by cleaning the surface and throughly drying.

Apply the transfer tape and vinyl to the object from the center out being careful not to get folds or large bubbles.

Use a credit card to rub the sticker for a good bond.





Gently remove the transfer tape. Go slow and push the vinyl back down if it starts to lift.





If you are very careful you can skip the transfer tape. I don't recommend this method but with enough care it will work.
